President Museveni Promises to Upgrade Kikuube Health Centre IV to District Hospital Status

President Yoweri Kaguta Museveni has pledged to upgrade Kikuube Health Centre IV into a fully-fledged district hospital in a move aimed at strengthening health service delivery in Kikuube District.

Speaking on Saturday, 13 December 2025, during a campaign rally at Kikuube Saaza Grounds, the President noted that while Kikuube has at least a Health Centre III or IV in every sub-county, the district still lacks a main district hospital to serve its growing population.

“The district has health centre IIIs and IVs, but you do not have a district hospital. We are going to upgrade Kikuube Health Centre IV into a district hospital so that health services are closer and more comprehensive,” President Museveni said.

He also endorsed the request to upgrade Bugambe Health Centre III to

Health Centre IV status and to improve infrastructure at all Health Centre IIIs in the district.

During his address, President Museveni cautioned residents against illegal and harmful fishing practices on Lake Albert, particularly the catching of young fish and overfishing. He likened the need for regulation on the lake to the capacity limits at Namboole Stadium, emphasizing that resources must be managed sustainably.

He announced that government will support the introduction of modern fish farming alternatives, including fish ponds for selected fish farmers along the lake, to reduce pressure on the lake and increase household incomes.

The President urged voters to embrace commercial agriculture and learn from the four-acre model farm of State Minister for Transport, Hon. Fred

Hoima District Launches Cleaning Days Campaign

Hoima District has launched the National Cleaning Days Initiative, a community-driven program aimed at improving public health and environmental hygiene through regular, coordinated cleaning activities.

The initiative was officially commissioned by Benard Mujuni, Commissioner for Rights and Equity in the Ministry of Gender, Labour and Social Development, during an event to commemorate the 16 Days of Activism held at Kyohiarwe Primary School in Buhanka Sub-county.

Mujuni noted that the program is part of the government's broader effort to empower communities to take greater responsibility for their own health and wellbeing.

He explained that by encouraging citizens to improve sanitation and hygiene in their homes and neighborhoods, the initiative directly addresses key social

determinants of health, including cleanliness, waste management, and safe living conditions.

"The government is promoting this initiative to ensure that communities recognize their cardinal role in maintaining their own health," Mujuni said. "Clean environments reduce the burden of disease and enhance people's quality of life."

Representing the Hoima Chief Administrative Officer, Evelyn K. Businge called on residents to actively embrace the initiative, emphasizing that a safe and clean environment is essential for sustainable development.

She urged local leaders, institutions, and households to participate fully and lead by example in their respective areas.

Under the new program, Hoima District will observe a National Cleaning Day on the last Saturday of every month. All community members are expected

Byamukama, as a pathway to improved livelihoods.

“You should copy Hon. Byamukama’s four-acre model so that each family can have steady income. We want every household engaged in productive commercial agriculture,” he said.

Kikuube District NRM Chairperson and Buhaguzi County MP, Hon. Kazini Francis Twinomujuni, commended the President for key developments in the district and the greater Bunyoro region. He cited the establishment of Bunyoro University, construction of critical oil roads, the Bunyoro Zonal Industrial Hub, various infrastructure projects and wealth creation initiatives as interventions that have significantly transformed the area.

Hon. Kazini, however, presented several additional requests on behalf of the district, including:

- A ferry across Lake Albert to ease cross-border market access to the Democratic Republic of Congo and boost international trade.
- The upgrade of Kikuube Health Centre IV to a district hospital and Bugambe Health Centre III to Health Centre IV, alongside infrastructure upgrades at all Health Centre IIIs.

- Upgrading the Katasiiha–Bugambe–Buseruka road to tarmac, noting that it links Kikuube to Hoima City and Hoima District and serves as a shortcut to the international airport.

- Permanent resettlement for internally displaced persons in camps in Kigyayo, Bukinda and Katikara, who have been affected by prolonged and unresolved land disputes.

- A milk cooler and a milk collection truck for Kyarushesha cattle farmers, as the existing cooler is in poor condition.

- A school bus for Kiziranfumbi Secondary School.

- A tractor for use by youth, women and persons with disabilities.

According to local leaders, the President “greatly agreed” with the key health, infrastructure and social support requests presented.

Speaker Among Raises Governance and Environmental Concerns

The Speaker of Parliament and NRM Second National Vice Chairperson, Rt. Hon. Anita Annet Among, lauded Kikuube leaders for their lobbying efforts and



strong working relationship with central government.

She pointed out urgent issues requiring immediate attention in the district, including:

- Encroachment on Bugoma Forest.
- The unresolved Bukinda land matter.
- The need for more irrigation schemes to support agriculture.
- Complaints of excessive harassment of the fishing community on Lake Albert by security personnel.

She noted that President Museveni had pledged to look into these concerns and work with the relevant agencies to find lasting solutions.

Kikuube District Chairperson (Governor), Hon. Peter Banura, thanked the President for major developments in the Bunyoro region, including Kabalega International Airport, Hoima Stadium and ongoing oil and gas infrastructure projects.

He called on all residents of Kikuube to support President Museveni and NRM flag bearers in the forthcoming elections in order to “protect the gains” made in the district and the region.

The rally at Kikuube Saaza Grounds drew leaders and residents from across the district, many of whom welcomed the promise of a district hospital as a milestone in improving access to quality health care.



Kiryandongo Launches New Infrastructure to Improve Health Service Delivery

Kiryandongo District authorities have launched key health infrastructure projects aimed at improving service delivery and strengthening medical waste management across the district.

The District has commenced the construction of combustion chambers at several health facilities to promote safe and effective disposal of medical waste. The projects, valued at 190 million shillings, were launched at Karuma Health Centre II, Kiroko Health Centre II, and Diima Health Centre III. Meanwhile, similar facilities at Kichwabugingo and Apodorwa Health Centre IIs have been completed, commissioned, and officially handed over for use.

In a move to enhance patient care and privacy, authorities have also launched the partitioning of the surgical ward at Kiryandongo General Hospital. The

upgrade is intended to ensure privacy for patients while promoting gender-inclusive health services.

Additional infrastructure initiatives include the installation of prepaid electricity meters at staff quarters at Kiryandongo General Hospital to help regulate and reduce electricity costs. Solar power installation at Karuma Health Centre II was also launched, a step expected to improve access to reliable energy and support uninterrupted health service delivery.

Jonathan Akweteireho, the Deputy Resident District Commissioner (RDC) for Kiryandongo, emphasized that improving health infrastructure is a key pillar of the NRM's policy on providing accessible and high-quality healthcare to all Ugandans.

"The government of Uganda is

committed to providing efficient health services to the people of Kiryandongo and Uganda at large as stipulated in the NRM manifesto,” Akweteireho stated. He further explained the immediate benefit of the new facilities, adding that “the burning chambers will ensure a tidy health facility environment for both the health workers and the patients,” effectively addressing long-standing medical waste management challenges.

The push for utilizing new facilities was echoed by Chief Administrative Officer (CAO), Anselm Kyaligonza. Kyaligonza stressed the administrative necessity of officially commissioning completed infrastructure promptly, cautioning that delays could lead to scrutiny during financial audits.

“Failure to commission completed

infrastructure is an audit query we must avoid,” Kyaligonza stated. He elaborated that a lack of use could lead auditors to the conclusion that the infrastructure was never needed in the first place, a perception the district aims to prevent by ensuring all completed projects are brought into operation efficiently.

All the infrastructure developments have been funded by the Government of Uganda through the Primary Health Care (PHC) grant, underscoring the government’s commitment to strengthening health systems at the grassroots level.

District leaders expressed optimism that the projects will significantly improve working conditions for health workers and the quality of care provided to residents across Kiryandongo District.



Kibaale District Boosts Practical Farming Education to Enhance Crop Production

Kibaale district is ramping up the establishment of practical learning centers to empower local farmers with improved agricultural techniques and, ultimately, increase crop production.

Initially focusing on key crops like coffee, bananas, and other perennials, the district's Production Department is prioritizing coffee yield improvement and farmer well-being. District extension staff are actively introducing farmers to modern and more effective farming methods.

During a recent hands-on training session in Kayanja sub-county, Agricultural Officer Denis Kyaligonza demonstrated the recommended methods for preparing coffee seedling planting holes to over 30 beneficiaries of the PDM (Parish Development Model)

program. He urged the farmers to adhere to the guidelines to ensure optimal plant growth.

Kyaligonza explained that, for years, local farmers have relied on traditional methods, such as digging shallow holes with rudimentary tools. This approach has resulted in low coffee seedling survival rates, exacerbated by drought and poor soil conditions.

He emphasized the importance of preparing planting holes measuring 2ft x 2ft, highlighting the benefits, including improved water retention, easier manure application, and accelerated seedling growth.

"This method will significantly increase the survival rate of the seedlings," he stated.

The training session is part of a broader initiative to elevate agricultural

practices and boost coffee production in the region. Farmers are optimistic that adopting these new techniques will translate into higher yields and improved livelihoods.

Local farmers expressed their gratitude for the training and committed to implementing the new methods to ensure the healthy growth of their plants.

Kyaligonza concluded the session by stating that improved coffee production is expected to have a significant positive impact on the local farming community. Increased yields could lead to higher incomes for farmers and enhanced food security within the district.

The adoption of these new techniques

is also expected to promote sustainable agricultural practices, reducing soil degradation and fostering environmental conservation.

While welcoming these advancements, farmers appealed to the government for assistance in accessing quality seeds, fertilizers, and other essential inputs to further enhance their crop production.

The introduction of these new coffee planting techniques in Kisojo Parish marks a step in the right direction for local farmers. With sustained support, they are well-positioned to increase their yields and improve their economic well-being.

President Museveni Pledges District Hospital for Hoima

President Yoweri Kaguta Museveni has pledged to upgrade Kigoroby Health Centre IV in Hoima District to a fully fledged district hospital, in a move aimed at strengthening health

service delivery in the area.

Kigoroby Health Centre IV is located in Kigoroby Town Council along the Hoima–Buliisa road in Kigoroby Constituency. The president made

the commitment while addressing a campaign rally for both Hoima District and Hoima City at Booma Grounds.

Museveni said the construction and upgrade of health facilities is a key component of government's social infrastructure development agenda.

As part of the planned upgrades, the president also announced that Buseruka Health Centre III will be elevated to Health Centre IV status. Other health facilities set for upgrading, according to the president, include Kasabengwa, Kiganja, Bombo and Kijongo, all in Hoima District.

Beyond health, Museveni urged the people of Bunyoro to embrace commercial agriculture as a pathway to improved household incomes. He encouraged farmers to adopt the Four-Acre Model of farming, which he said has positively transformed the livelihoods of many farmers across the country.

The president further emphasized

that while Uganda expects significant revenue from its oil and gas sector, the country will not rely on petroleum resources alone. He said proceeds from oil development will be invested in sustainable sectors of the economy to ensure long-term development even after oil and gas resources are exhausted.

Museveni reiterated that he would not tolerate any misuse of oil and gas revenues on non-productive or luxurious expenditures.

He noted that Uganda has made progress in job creation across various sectors of the economy, particularly in agriculture, industry, hospitality, transport, trade, sports, the arts and ICT.

The president also revealed that the operationalization of Kabalega Industrial Park will be anchored on petrochemical-related industries, positioning the region as a key player in the country's emerging oil and gas value chain.

Government Reaffirms Commitment to Ending Gender-Based Violence in the Digital Age

The government has reaffirmed its commitment to ending gender-based violence (GBV) and protecting human rights, particularly in the rapidly expanding digital space.

Speaking as chief guest at the 16 Days of Activism commemoration on Wednesday, December 10, 2025, Mr. Benard Mujuni, the Commissioner for Rights and Equity in the Ministry of Labour, Gender and Social

Development, said the government is strengthening mechanisms to promote digital literacy as a key strategy in combating GBV against women and girls.

The event, organized by Hoima District Local Government in partnership with several development partners, was held at Kyohairwe Primary School in Buhanika Sub-county.

Mr. Mujuni noted that as digital technologies become more entrenched in everyday life, new forms of abuse are emerging online, targeting especially women and young girls through harassment, exploitation and other violations.

He emphasized that digital abuse should be treated as a serious human rights violation and said the government is working to ensure a safer digital environment for all, including by raising awareness and building community capacity to identify, report and prevent online violence.

The Hoima District LCV Chairperson, represented by the Secretary for Social Services, Mr. Hillary Tumusiime, called on parents and caregivers to take an active role in educating and protecting their children from the growing threats of gender-based violence, both offline and online.

Tumusiime said Hoima District is committed to extending essential services to communities in Buhanika Sub-county, including safe water, education facilities and the promotion of government programmes aimed at improving household incomes.

He commended the Ministry of Gender, Labour and Social Development for consistently supporting Hoima District through initiatives such as the Uganda Women Entrepreneurship Programme (UWEP), the Youth Livelihood Programme (YLP) and grants for Persons with Disabilities (PWDs), which he said have positively impacted many households.

The Hoima Chief Administrative Officer, represented by Ms. Evelyne K. Businge, the Principal Assistant Secretary, urged all stakeholders to join hands in the fight

against GBV, which she said continues to destabilize families and erode cultural values.

She thanked the development partners for working closely with Hoima District Local Government to organize a successful and impactful commemoration.

Ms. Annet Kyalimpa Mugabe, the Director of Programs at Reproductive Health Uganda (RHU), who spoke on behalf of development partners, highlighted the far-reaching consequences of GBV on survivors, including stress, shame and reduced productivity.

She noted that many victims spend valuable time seeking justice and medical care instead of engaging in productive activities, thereby affecting household and community development. She urged families to be at the forefront of preventing and reporting GBV in their communities.

The commemoration was organized in collaboration with a wide range of development partners, including Reproductive Health Uganda (RHU), the Center for Health, Human Rights and



Development (CEHURD), Uganda Rural Development and Training Programme (URDT), Baylor Uganda, Redeem, HOPLA Network for People Living with HIV, Fibal Care Initiative, Babra Kemigisa Foundation, the Uganda Red Cross Society and Hoima Blood Bank, among others.

This year's 16 Days of Activism was marked under the theme: "Ending Digital Violence Against All Women and Girls to Achieve Gender Equality."

The day's events began with a justice run aimed at raising awareness about GBV and promoting access to justice for survivors. Residents also participated in

a general cleaning exercise at Butema Trading Centre, as well as blood donation drives and a medical camp that offered free services to hundreds of people.

In addition to the 16 Days of Activism against GBV, the event was used to commemorate the International Day of Persons with Disabilities, World AIDS Day and International Human Rights Day, underscoring the interconnected nature of rights, health and dignity for all citizens.

Greed Fuels Corruption in Civil Service Recruitment, Study Reveals

A recent study has revealed the pervasive extent of corruption within the recruitment of civil servants in Uganda, highlighting greed as a major catalyst. The findings, presented by John Bosco Kabale, an official from the Inspectorate of Government (IG), at a stakeholder meeting in Kibaale District, paint a concerning picture of systemic graft undermining public service delivery.

The report, a collaboration between the IG and the Economic Policy Research Centre (EPRC) at Makerere University, investigated corruption in District Service Commissions (DSCs) between 2018 and 2022. It exposed practices including bribery, forgery, political interference, and nepotism, leading to compromised hiring quality and significant financial losses.

The study estimates that job applicants

were asked for bribes totaling UGX 78 billion over five years, with UGX 29 billion actually paid. Extrapolating from sampled districts, the annual cost is projected at UGX 42.34 billion nationwide.

Factors facilitating corruption include high unemployment, patronage-based DSC appointments, political interference, inadequate funding, and weak oversight.

In response, Kibaale District stakeholders cited poor remuneration, brokerage, and political interference as threats to transparent recruitment. The report proposes key policy recommendations, including merit-based DSC appointments through direct Public Service Commission applications, higher minimum qualifications for DSC members, improved remuneration, and

automated e-recruitment processes to minimize physical contact and expedite hiring.

The dissemination of these findings aligns with ongoing national efforts to curb corruption. Local leaders

and stakeholders welcomed the recommendations, emphasizing the need for swift implementation to restore meritocracy, improve service delivery, and enhance public officer salaries as a critical step in combating corruption.

Buliisa District Boosts Healthcare with 78 New Community Health Workers

Buliisa District Local Government, in collaboration with the Ministry of Health and with support from TASO Uganda, has deployed 78 newly trained Community Health Extension Workers (CHEWs) to serve all 39 parishes within the district.

The graduation ceremony, held at Buliisa District Headquarters, was presided over by the Director General of Health Services (DGHS) at the Ministry of Health, Dr. Charles Olaro, along with other Ministry officials. Dr. Olaro expressed optimism about the role of the CHEWs in promoting primary healthcare at the community level, noting that these graduates are part of over 2,000 CHEWs

trained across the country.

The CHEWs have undergone training in an abridged Primary Health Care curriculum, emphasizing core principles. Their key roles include social mobilization, ensuring full childhood immunization, improving household health through safe water and sanitation, advocating for the use of government health services, participating in PDM activities, promoting mosquito net use, and promoting maternal and child health services.

The graduates were provided with essential equipment, including medicine boxes, glucometers, BP machines,

MUAC tapes, digital thermometers, Samsung Tablets for health data capture, gumboots, aprons, jackets, first aid medicine boxes, and bicycles to facilitate their work.

Local leaders, including the Deputy Resident District Commissioner and representatives from the District Chairperson's office, congratulated

the CHEWs and pledged support for their work. The Chief Administrative Officer promised to enroll them as Local Government auxiliary staff at the Parish level and urged health sector players to utilize the CHEWs to improve health indicators in the district.

Buliisa Health Centre IV Theatre Renovated, Commissioned for Surgery

Buliisa Health Centre IV, one of the oldest health facilities in Buliisa District, has resumed full surgical operations after the revitalization and commissioning of its theatre, marking a major boost for emergency and routine surgical care in the area.

The milestone follows the posting of a new facility in-charge, Senior Medical Officer Dr. Otim Peter Nurdin, whose leadership is credited with fast-tracking the revival of the theatre for Emergency Obstetric Care and other surgical services.

The theatre was officially commissioned on 11 December 2025 by Dr. Richard Mugahi, Commissioner for Reproductive Health Services at the Ministry of Health, shortly after President Yoweri Museveni concluded his campaign trail in the district.

Presiding over the event, Dr. Mugahi thanked the Buliisa Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) for facilitating the theatre's functionality by deploying proactive health managers. He noted that every Health Centre IV is mandated to provide Emergency Obstetric Care and blood transfusion, questioning why Buliisa HC IV had gone so long without conducting such services.

The commissioner pledged continued support from the Ministry of Health to further improve maternal health services across the district.

Buliisa CAO, Prof. Dr. Levi Musinguzi Bahemuka, said improving service delivery remains his top priority and warned that he will not tolerate technical staff who frustrate government efforts to bring services closer to the people.

District Health Officer, Dr. Sabiiti Titus Nixon, informed the commissioner that Buliisa has two Health Centre IVs due to its geographical setup: Buliisa HC IV serves Lower Buliisa, while Biiso HC IV serves Upper Buliisa. He committed to ensuring that both theatres remain fully operational to reduce referrals to Buliisa General Hospital for emergency surgeries.

Dr. Otim, the in-charge of Buliisa HC IV, pledged to enhance the quality of care at the facility and extend services into the community through integrated outreaches and regular community medical camps. He said he would work

closely with Village Health Teams (VHTs) and Community Health Extension Workers (CHEWs) to organize village health camps, community dialogues, and identify hard-to-reach areas so that no community is left behind.
